

# Californians and Education—April 2022

## Full Crosstabs – Likely Voters Only

### Methodology Note:

Findings are based on a survey of 1,591 California adult residents, conducted online using the Ipsos KnowledgePanel. Interviews were conducted in English, Spanish, Chinese (simplified or traditional), Korean, and Vietnamese according to the respondents' preferences. The median time to complete the survey was 20.2 minutes. Interviewing took place from March 30–April 13, 2022.

These crosstabs are based on a subgroup of 1,059 California adult likely voters. The sampling error, taking design effects from weighting into consideration, is  $\pm 3.9$  percent at the 95 percent confidence level for the unweighted sample of 1,059 likely voters. The sampling error for unweighted likely voter subgroups is larger. Sampling error is only one type of error to which surveys are subject. Results may also be affected by factors such as question wording, question order, and survey timing.
